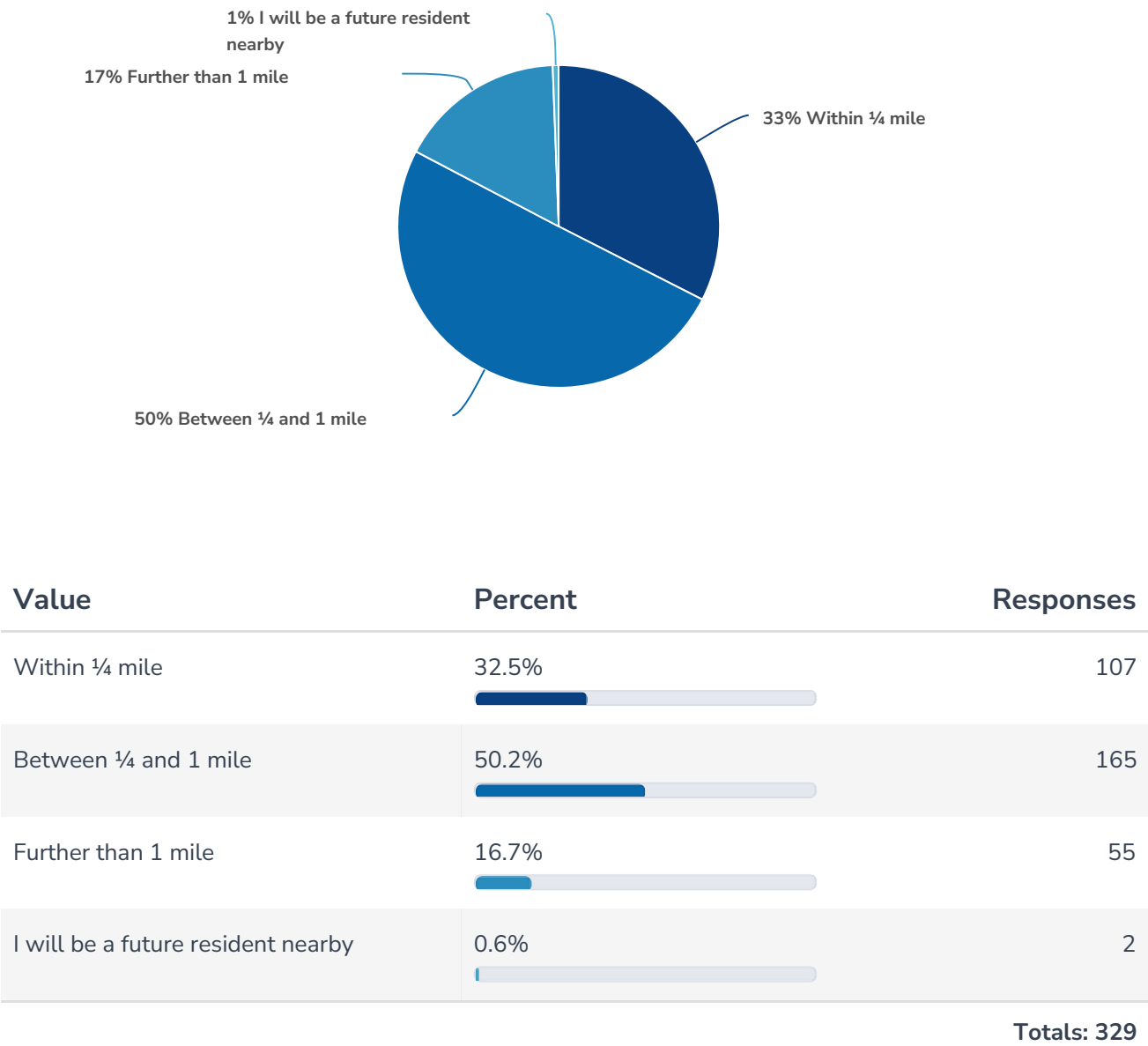

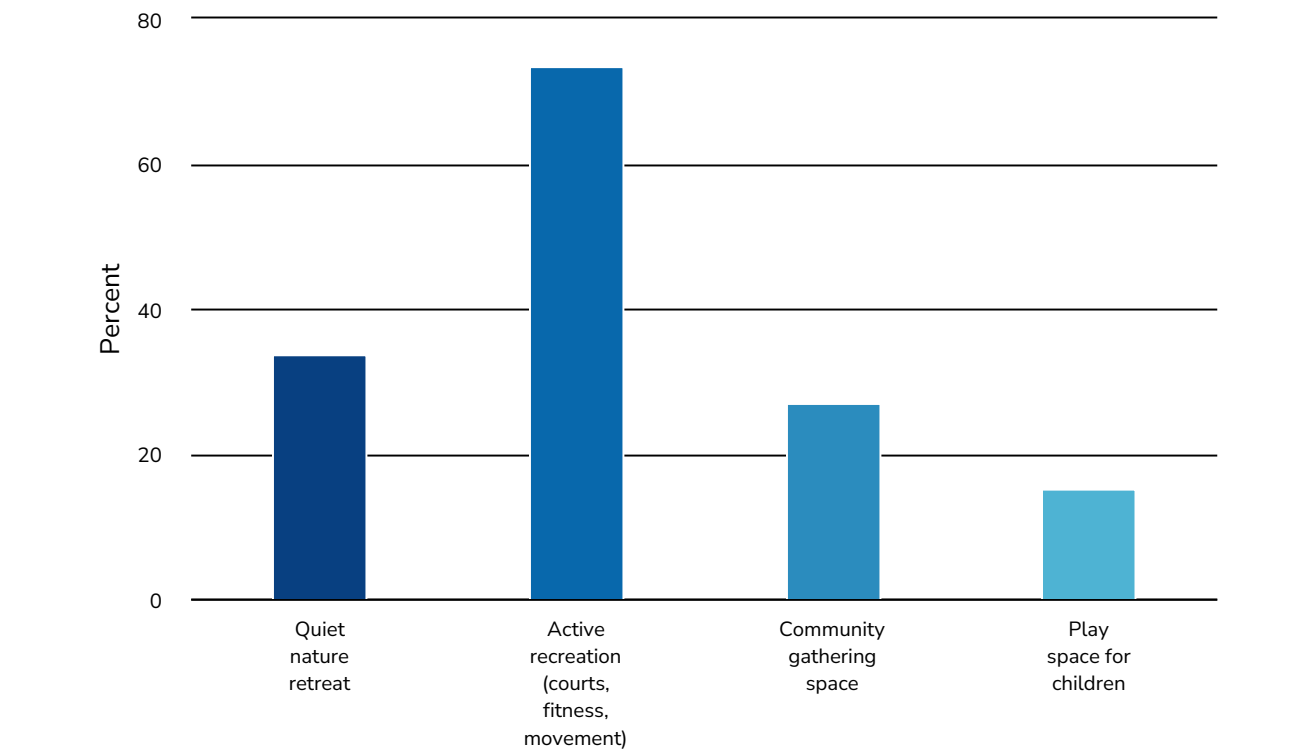
1. Have you visited Pioneer Park before?



2. How close do you live to Pioneer Park?

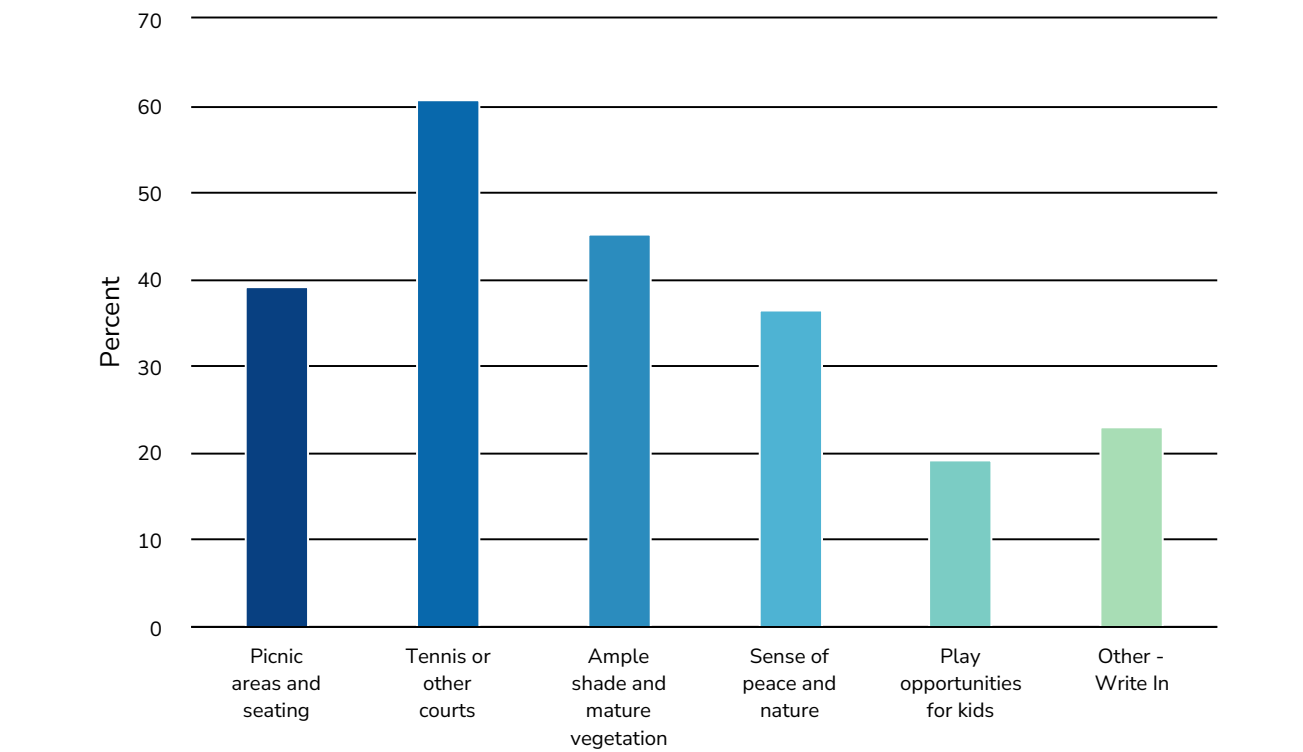


3. What best describes the overall character you'd like for Pioneer Park?

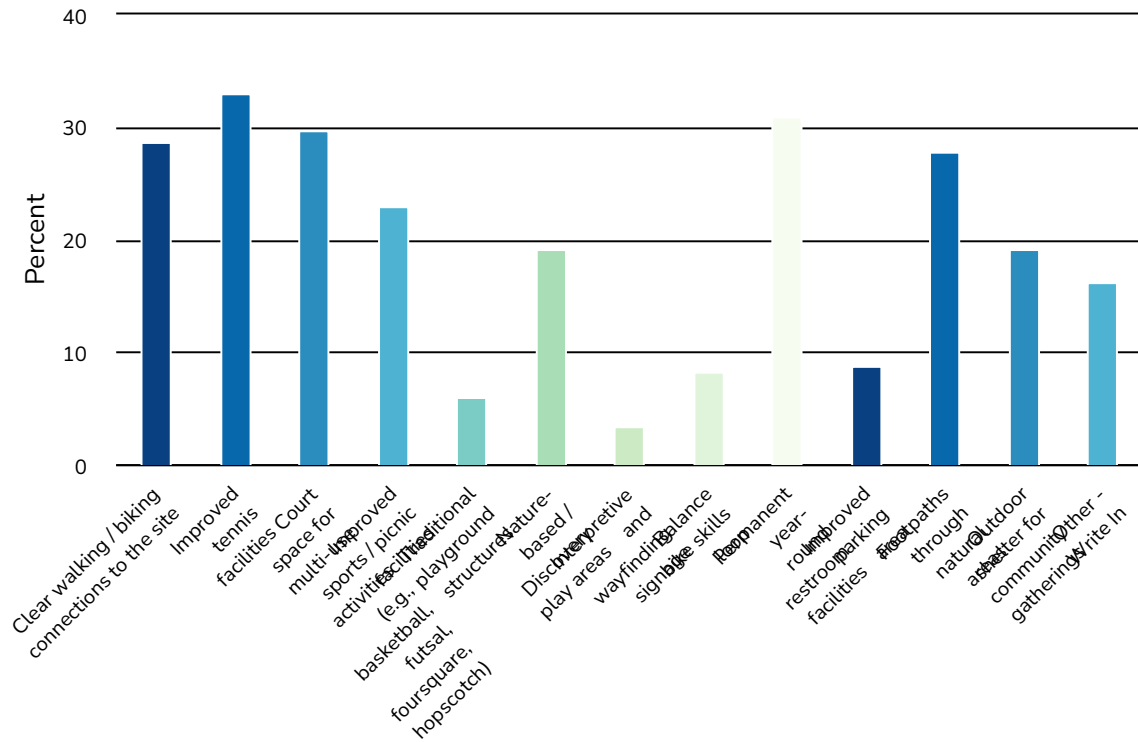















6. For what age groups would you like to see more or different facilities in the improved park? (Choose 2)

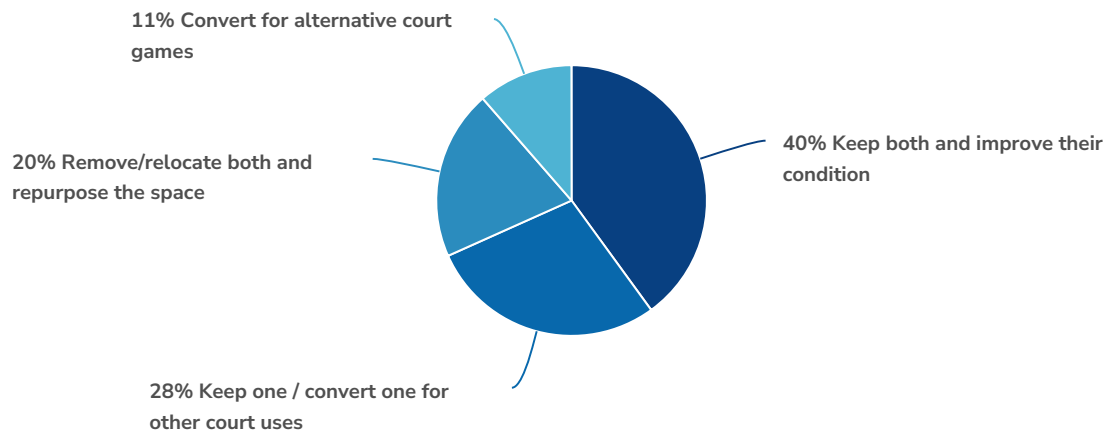

- 41 Summit County has a VERY active pickleball community that I enjoy participating in. As Frisco resident who lives very close to Pioneer Park (I can see the tennis courts from my front door), I would LOVE another Pickleball court option in Frisco. Currently, only option in Frisco is Frisco MS which is not usable while school is in session. It doesn't have to be Pioneer. But if not there, I don't know where. It is in a neighborhood with other houses even closer than mine. I feel like tennis and pickleball are ok noise-wise. However, I would love to NOT have the hitting backboard for tennis (which makes a lot of noise) and would also prefer to avoid basketball (same issue) unless there could be noise mitigation. I do feel Pioneer is very under-used compared to Walter Byron.
- 43 The best thing about this park is it is a picket park. Besides playing tennis I like this park because it is close to town and it remains in its natural landscape. Not everything needs to be over developed. The wetlands here attract many animals from raccoons, rabbits, fox, bear, moose, squirrels, chipmunks and birds. With Walter Byron right across the river and tennis being a very small and seasonal interest in the community I personally would like to see it be rethought as a quiet and welcoming space for all ages. It is easy access from main street and could easily be a meditation walking path surrounded by native landscaping, possibly with a (summer) water feature like the post office area. Benches could welcome people to sit and rest or reflect. In the winter it could still be usable, much like many parks. There could also be fun bike and walking connector trails and signs about how to get to Walter Byron. Perhaps it could be renamed and be a memorial park for some of our renowned former residents. 123 Did not know this was a public park. Would like to see signage and some landscaping to make it more recognizable and "Frisco". Great place to convert courts from 2 tennis to 4 pickleball...fastest growth sport in country.

126 We have loved the tennis courts over the years, and our guests still use them. We have aged past our tennis playing years, and seating would be a lovely addition to the area.

127 Pioneer Park is a small, special place tucked quietly into the heart of Frisco, a block from Main Street, surrounded by wetlands, wildflowers, and trees, with two modest tennis courts and a few picnic tables. It's not flashy, and that's exactly what makes it so special. If you want flashy go to Walter Byron Park less than 800 feet away. This park is a rare kind of space: a (pocket park) of quiet solitude where residents and downtown workers can take a quick break from the noise and bustle without needing to drive into the forest or plan a hike. It's a local gem that people find and fall in love with on their own and doesn't need to be advertised. I understand there's a conversation about how to make this park more "inclusive" or developed, especially with new workforce housing going in nearby. While accessibility and inclusivity are important goals, not all improvements are about building more. Sometimes, the best way to preserve access for all is to protect the peace and simplicity of a place. Pioneer Park doesn't need big signage, expanded parking, or overbuilt infrastructure. In fact, too much change would harm what makes it valuable, not just to people but to the wildlife that also calls it home. The wetlands, trees, and undisturbed ground are a haven for squirrels, foxes, rabbits, chipmunks, moose, and even the occasional bear. This delicate ecosystem won't survive heavy foot traffic, artificial boardwalks, or noise. That said, there are a few small, thoughtful upgrades that could help without altering the park's essence: • Paving the dirt parking lot to reduce runoff and make access more stable. • Adding a simple gazebo or shelter near the existing picnic tables to offer cover from rain while keeping the structure modest and natural-looking. • Adding permanent restrooms, rather than just having the porta potty that is currently there. • Keeping any enhancements low profile, using natural materials and signage that blends into the environment — or omitting signs entirely to preserve the feeling of discovery. The best thing we can do is leave Pioneer Park largely alone — let people find it the way it's always been found: by walking, exploring, or hearing about it from a neighbor. That's part of its magic. If too many people are directed there or if it's developed like a tourist destination, we lose what makes it special for both the community and the wildlife. Help me keep this a pocket of peace, quiet, modest, and wild. A park for those who need it most, exactly the way it is.

129 Frisco could use a gym or mini rec-center. Uncovered tennis courts are useless for 6 months up here.

130 I don't mind that they are tennis courts, but I think they should have multiple use with basketball courts as well. Except for the middle school, there are zero basketball hoops in Frisco.

131 I think the playground at Walter Byron is wonderful, and we use it often. It seems like the tennis courts might be a better fit there, and that Pioneer Park would be better as a natural space. We look for wildflowers there, but it's hard to access.

- 132 Little kids parks we have covered well. Big kids need options (Adventure park is great but far for kids to be allowed to ride to alone). Basketball, batting cages (coin op? loaner bats/helmets? Would this need to be manned?) Is there a town indoor space neighbors could congregate at for board games or receptions that is free/cheap to rent? i.e. "new moms meet and greet" event or book club or knitting club? Can residents in town who dont have a large enough home to host or who live with roommates rent or reserve a common indoor space affordably to connect with other community members (like just the small bldgs put at Trent park or summit sky parks?) Something like a small year round Bldg (unless old senior center meets this need?) with different activities (bball, pickleball, tennis) around it. I think the tennis is underutilized but is that bc no one knows its for public use? or would loaner raquets/balls increase use? (I assume this is not enough space for a Frisco Rec Center or pool but we would really want both of those - maybe on peninsula?) Is there a need for a small fitness space (not full rec center) just for yoga or cardio or whatever most desired is? What fitness still exists in Frisco other than CrossFit?
- 133 Keep the 2 courts!!! Keep it possible to park close to the gate for unloading equipment i use for kids (ball machines, large numbers of practice balls). These courts are very useful in their present form, please don't make them less useful.
- 134 Helping build a space to keep young adults & older kids active. Keep and preserve the tennis community. We have enough pickle ball courts. Consider climbing structures, ladders/rings, basketball courts. Maybe a zip line/tree park in the area of wetlands preserving trees. Also I would NOT suggest paving the parking and keeping the "road" and parking as dirt. I would worry about excessive run off and drainage issues if paved. Winter park ideas to have ice skating/ ice hockey area with led string lights overhead. Maybe small igloo fort and ice slides. Could also be a spot where the ice sculptures and maybe wassail days could be incorporated.

Also love to see pickleball. May want to consider flex court space that could accommodate different user groups. Would also be great to have a nice place to sit and relax and observe nature.
- 166 Make Pioneer Park more affordable housing units. We have enough pocket parks in town. We do not have enough housing. Walter Byron Park has plenty of room and is only two blocks away!
- 167 The town tennis courts are awesome. Please improve them with either concrete ones (will last a long time, 50 plus years) or clay courts which will be amazing addition to the town courts. Add a picnic area with a small kids area, maybe a rock climbing wall, basketball courts or a play structure.
- 168 I am an avid tennis player, and I am frankly surprised by how many more reside in the surrounding area. The courts are busier than many think. We need to keep and improve upon this amenity as we are losing court space to pickleball or only pay-to-play facilities. Tennis is one of the best cross training activities for winter sports.
