In addition to my work, I feel deeply connected to my community here and enjoy the many recreational opportunities the town offers, including biking, skiing, paddleboarding, and spending time in the beautiful spaces that make this town so special.

Housing and workforce retention: Expanding attainable housing options is essential to maintaining community stability, local business and programs remain adequately staffed.

Economic and social resilience in a changing policy and climate landscape: As climate change impacts snowpack and tourism, and as federal policies rapidly evolve, Frisco must support a resilient and diversified economy while ensuring essential resources remain available in Summit County. This includes maintaining access to social services, mental health care, and community support programs so residents and businesses can remain stable and supported even during periods of uncertainty.

Wildfire resilience and environmental sustainability: Increasing wildfire risk and climate impacts require proactive forest management, emergency preparedness, and long-term sustainability planning. Protecting natural resources while strengthening infrastructure is critical to community safety and environmental health.

Strong sense of community: Frisco is a place where we look out for one another and actively invest in our town.
